In 1948, the Women's Armed Services Integration Act was passed. For the first time, women could serve permanently during peacetime. While imperfect, it set the stage for the expansions that followed.

“Although allowed to serve during wartime, women were subjected to outlandish uniform requirements, like skirts and girdles ... in WWI. Pants were not authorized 'til WWII... .”
